This course will explore several key topics in Jewish thought. Broadly defined this course will consider areas in which modern axiology and epistemology come into tension with those of the tradition. In each case, we will consider the traditional (both biblical and rabbinic) sources for these values or beliefs and the different ways in which thinkers through out Jewish history have addressed these tensions. Along the way we will become familiar with the major characters in the drama of Jewish thought in general and of the Jewish navigation of modernity in particular.
